Leah is playing a Salvi Aurora pedal harp which was made in Piasco, Italy. This harp has 47 strings and seven pedals connected to rods which change the pitch of each string. The harp weighs over 90 pounds.

The spinet (small harpsichord) used in today's concert has 51 strings and was made in Denver, Colorado by Thomas Bailey. It was designed after the traditional English bentside spinets. This spinet weighs 40 pounds.
